Arnold Knows Me: The Tommy Kono Story, by Ryan Yamamoto & Suzanne Phan

Sacramentan Tommy Kono is most decorated American weightlifter in the history of the sport. Between 1952 and 1960, Kono won 2 Olympic gold medals, an Olympic silver medal, and 6 World Championship titles. Kono also won several body building competitions including the Mr. Universe and Mr. World titles. Kono made the cover of several muscle magazine and weightlifting publications becoming a "rock star" in the sport— garnering the attention of athletes like Arnold Schwarzenegger.

Replacing the Past: Sacramento's Redevelopment History, by Chris Lango

This documentary examines controversial efforts to remake Sacramento's urban core more than fifty years ago. The 20-year transformation began in the late 1950s, encompassed 200 city blocks, displaced thousands of residents and shuttered numerous businesses. Tracing the origins of Old Sacramento, Capitol Mall, K Street Mall, along with the routes of Interstate 5 and Highway 50, the documentary delves into why city and business leaders deemed the makeover necessary and how these efforts created a blueprint for cities across the nation to follow suit.
